

The year is 1986. The event is the eleventh Annual Chicago Comicon. The Guest-of-Honor is none other than Stan Lee, celebrating 25 years of Marvel's greatest super heroes.


Since 1961, when Fantastic Four, Spidey, and the Hulk emerged from a comic book line that had featured characters such as "Fin Fang Foom" and "Rro", Stan has been the guiding light who helped propel Marvel to the Number One position in comic sales in the world.

While not active in the current comic book line (though still penning an occasional tale like the recent Fantastic Four Anniversary issue), Stan still webs Spiderman's adventures that appear in the Chicago Tribune and numerous other daily newpspaers across the country.

Now headquartered in Hollywood, Stan is also the creative head of Marvel Productions, which provides the animation for numerous Saturday morning and syndicated cartoon series. He somehow finds time to act as liason with the many studios that have options on Marvel characters and plan to bring them to the big and small screens.

In this Anniversary Year of Marvel, Stan is traveling the Convention Circuit again, and we're ecstatic to have our very first GOH back again. 'Nuff Said.

Special Guest: George Perez

The Special Guest of the 1986 Chicago Comicon is one of the most popular and influential Comic Artists of the last decade, George Perez. This is George's first appearance at the Comicon and we are proud to have him as our Special Guest.

George's success story in the comics field reflects the dreams of everyone who wants to work in the industry. A native of New York City, he is self-taught, using his favorite comics as models for

his own early work.

A comic fan, George attended conventions in Manhatten in the early 1970's where he showed his work to some of the professionals in attendence. After a short period assisting Rich Buckler in 1973, George began pencilling directly for Marvel. The first feature he drew was Man Wolf in <u>Creatures on the Loose</u>. Within a short time, Perez moved up to top Marvel sellers including the Fantastic Four and the Avengers.

In the late 1970's, George started working on The New Teen Titans. The book quickly became one of the most popular comics in the field, vaulting Perez into the top echelons of comic illustrators. In 1984, George gave up the Titans to work on Crisis on Infinite Earths. Future plans include numerous special projects and a new version of Wonder Woman.

It has been said of George Perez that "He has brought back some of the energy and excitement missing from the comics." Could there be any better reason than that to feature George Perez as our Special

Have we got a mammoth guest line-up for you.

At press-time, (nearly six weeks before the Show), we have an official list of over 75 guests - including Guest-of-Honor Stan Lee, profiled earlier in these pages.

Additions to our guest list will be noted in our Pocket Schedule which accompanies this Program Book. But that insert is printed a week before the Show, and we always have a few last minute surprises. Keep your eyes peeled for last minute annoucements as well as special guests in the Artists Rooms and all over the Comicon.

Now for a quick rundown of our confirmed guests as of today:

Mark Badger is presently the new penciller on American Flagg. For Marvel he did the "Greenberg the Vampire" graphic novel and the Gargoyle Mini-Series. Hilary Barda is a Chicago native and is currently inking the "Bob Violence" series for First Comics. Previously, he inked Starslayer, American Flagg and Munden's Bar for First, as well as The Thing for Marvel. Mike Baron is doing double duty for First and Comico. He is the creator/writer of Nexus and the Badger at First and writes Robotech Masters for Comico. Terry Beatty has been at every Chicago Comicon. He does the art for Renegade's Ms. Tree and has recently had a collection of his "Phony Pages" reprinted by Renegade. Brian Augustyn is the editor of Trollords. Paul Fricke and Scott Beaderstadt are the creative team on Trollords.

Eliot Brown, making his first appearance at a Chicago Con, has jumped from being technical illustrator on the Marvel Universe handbook series to editor of "Starbrand, Nightmask, Kickers Inc. and Justice" four of the titles in the New Universe series. Pat Bastienne is Dick Giorano's assistant. Reggie Byers is both and illustrator and publisher. For Comico, he pencils Robotech: The New Generation. He has published several issues of Shuriken, a popular black and white comic.

Howard Chaykin is the force behind some of the hottest selling comics in the industry. His American Flagg has been one of First's most popular series. His recent Shadow mini-series for DC sold out immediately after publication. His newest project, Time 2, will be released as a Graphic Novel in November, and there will be a preview of it this month in American Flagg Special # 1. The Art for these books will be previewed at the Comicon.

Michael Cherkas has done the art for a back-up series in Cerebus and is now collaborating on Renegade's new "Silent Invasion" series. Del Close is director of Second City and has written numerous "Munden's Bar" stories. Watch for him on our special Improvisational Panel. Max Allan Collins has his first Batman story in the works. He continues to write Dick Tracy, best selling mystery novels, and Ms. Tree for Renegade. Peter David is Marvel's Direct Sales Manager, and the writer of Merc, a New Universe title. Peter also did the popular "Death of Jean DeWolff" issues of Peter Parker last year. Dan Day is currently bringing the world's most famous detective to comics in Renegade's "Cases of Sherlock Holmes" series. Jeff Dee is working on illustrations for the game, Villains and Vigilantes.

Tom De Falco has been writing the Amazing Spiderman for some time and is also scripting Kickers Inc for the New Universe. Chuck Dixon is scripting Airboy for Eclipse. Steve Englehart continues to script Green Lantern Corps for DC, and West Coast Avengers, Daredevil, and The Silver Surfer for Marvel.

Ray Fehrenbach is a colorist and layout technician at Kitchen Sink Press when he isn't fiddling around in a country band. Laurel Fitch is the editor of First's Jon Sable, Hawkmoon, American Flagg, and the upcoming Corum series. Phil Foglio, a Chicago talent, was the original adaptor of the comic version of Myth Adventures. Phil is writing Munden's Bar and Dynamo Joe for First. Peter Gillis is the current writer and co-creator of First's computer comic, Shatter. For Marvel, Peter is writing Dr. Strange and the upcoming Morituri series.

A Chicago native, Dick Giordano is both DC's Executive Editor and the inker on John Byrne's Man of Steel series. Future projects for Dick include the revival of Sarge Steel, one of his 60's Charleton characters. In his spare time, he also serves as Vice-President and Executive Editor of DC Comics. Pat Bastienne is Dick Giordano's assistant.

Mike Gold is a senior editor at DC since leaving the Chicago Comic Scene. Mike is currently editing New Teen Titans, Teen Titans Spotlight, Vigilante, History of the DC Universe, The Shadow, Legends, The Quest, Freaks, Doom Patrol and The Flash. If you've never heard of some of these, catch the DC panel for the details. Archie Goodwin is a major creative contributor to Marvel's New Universe. He is the creator of PSI-Force and Merc, and creator/plotter of Nightmask and Justic. Steve Grant is the creator/writer of Whisper for First. He also is the current scripter for American Flagg.

Paul Guinan is a Chicago artist on the production staff of First and the currentinker on Grimjack.

Larry Hancock is a Canadian writer who is collaborating on Renegade's Silent Invasion series.

Andrew Helfer is the editor of all three Superman titles, Justice League, and is the writer of the Deadman mini-series. Jack Herman scripts Robotch: Macross and Robotech: The New Generation for Comico.

Rick Hoberg, formerly an assistant to Russ Manning on Tarzan is doing the art chores on Renegade's new color book, Eternity Smith.

Tony Isabella is carrying on the Shadow War of Hawkman for DC and is a Cleveland retailer of comics. Paul Kupperberg is a former Chicago resident and champion moderator of Comicon panels. He is currently scripting Super Powers Vigilante and the upcoming Doom Patrol series for DC.

Jenette Kahn is the President and Publisher of DC Comics, and one of the nicest people in the business. Linda Lessman is presently the colorist on American Flagg, Badger, Grimjack and many covers for First. Steve Lightle is the penciller on Legion of Super-Heroes and will be doing the same work on the new Doom Patrol. Dennis Mallonee is writing two new books for different companies. For Renegade, he's doing Eternity Smith; and for Eclipse, Champions, based on the role-playing game. Larry Marder is the creator of Tales of the Beanworld. Steve Mitchell is inking Firestorm, and working for Eclipse comics. Mark Nelson is presently both penciling and inking Clonezone, the back-up feature in First's Nexus. Chicago talent, Mindy Newell has written the recently complxted Lois Lane mini-series for DC and is currntly scripting a super hero team, The New Wave, for Eclipse.

Martin Nodell, a very popular figure from last year's convention, is back again. Martin co-created the original Green Lantern in 1940 and drew the feature for eight years. John Nyberg, a Chicago artist is the current inker on Nexus and Whisper for First. Mitch O'Connell, also a Chicago artist, is currently working on a graphic novel, "The World of Ginger Fox" for Comico. Jerry Ordway, a veteran of both Marvel and DC will be concentrating on the "New Adventures of Superman" when that book returns to the schedule later this year. John Ostrander, Chicago playwright and the creator of Grimjack and Munden's Bar for First is now co-scripting Legends and reviving the Suicide Squad for DC. John's Dr. Who play will hopefully materialize in Chicago later this year.

Steve Rude is the penciller of First's Nexus which he co-created. Willie Schubert is a Chicago letterer currently working on Badger, American Flagg and Dynamo Joe for First. Julius Schwartz, at age 71 is still going strong as the editor of DC's series of science fiction graphic novels. Dave Schreiner is an editor and writer at Kitchen Sink, dividing his time between The Spirit, Death Rattle and various other book projects. Eric Shanower wrote, pencilled, inked and colored the recent "Enchanted Apples of Oz" graphic novel from First.

Jim Shooter, Marvel's editor-in-chief, is also writing Starbrand, the flagship book of Marvel's New Universe. Marc Silvestri, a Chicago artist is currently pencilling Web of Spiderman for Marvel. Previously, he worked on King Conan. Donald Simpson has left the satiric world of Megaton Man for the science fiction setting of Border Worlds from Kitchen Sink Publications.



Japanese Television Spectacular Guide

"JAPAN-IMATION" (Cartoons)

- 1) COBRA the adventures in the far future of a rogue, thief, mercenary, and comman. Cobra, with the aid of his psyche-gun and his android companion, Ironlady, fights a never ending battle against Galactic Crime Lords and old enemies.
- 2) LENSMAN based on E.E. "Doc" Smith's classic space opera series, this show chronicles the exploits of Kim Kinnison, of the Galactic Patrol. The Patrol consists of Civilizations finest warriors banded together using the "Lens', a gift of an ancient alien race, to battle the evil empire of Boskone, for control of the galaxy.
- 3) PLAWRES SANSHIRO A switch on the giant robot theme, this show is about a giant corporation's search for the ultimate toy robot. Young geniuses build their own toy robots and use them to fight in elimination tournaments. The toy robot that survives the competition will be mass produced by the corporation, making the inventor rich and famous.
- 4) PANZERWORLD GALIENT in a parallel dimension, giant battle robts are used in a war of domination by an evil dictator. A feudal city-state has to use its own robots to defend itself and defeat the mad dictator and his mechanized army.
- 5) MIGHT ATOM (a.k.a. ASTROBOY) in the 21st century, a kindly scientist's son is critically injured in a car accident. The heartbroken scientist rebuilds his son as a robot. Using his dying son's brain cells, he activates the robot, naming it Mighty Atom. His son now lives on as a champion for justice. (This is a color episode from a remake of the original old series)

- 6) TETSUJIN 28 (a.k.a. GIGANTOR) in the near future, a scientist builds a might robt which his son operates by remote control, to fight the evil warlords and alien invaders who constantly threaten Earth (This is a color episode from the remake of the old series)
- 7) VOTOMS in the far future, a mighty Republic of Planets is locked in a struggle for supremecy with rebel forces. Both of them use robot battle suits and genetic superbeings in their war for control of the universe.
- 8) AURA BATTLER DUNBINE in a parallel dimension, warring city-states use Aur Battlers, insectoid robots powered by human aura's to fight each other. A man from our dimension enters that world. He joins one city-state and since he has a very powerful aura, using his battle suit he becomes its greatest warrior.
- 9) GALATT in a humorous vein, Galatt is about a group of teenagers in future Los Angeles who use slightly goofy giant robots to fight the ever-present alien invaders and evil robots.
- 10) URASHIMAN, FUTURE POLICE a two-bit crook from the present travels to the year 2050. The police of that era, sensing that the crook can help them in their struggle with Nemesis, a crime cartel, recruit the crook into their ranks, figuring that it takes a thief to catch a thief.
- 11) GODMARS the super-powered son of an overthrown king comes to Earth to help defend Earth against the conquerors of his planet. He utilizes six super robots who can combine into one giant robot powered by the son's own energy.
- 12) **XABUNGLE** in Earth's far future, the world has turned into a desert planet, constantly being mined for precious ores by giant cities on wheels. This show features a slightly klutzy country boy and his robot suit, having numerous adventures with the ruthless cities on wheels.

13) ZETA GUNDAM - the sequel to the immensely Gundam series of several years ago. This series was inspired by Robert Heinlein's novel, Starship Troopers. Wars in deep space are fought by men in giant power suits. This show, like the previous one, tells of the unending war between the fragmented worlds of mankind.

- 1) KAMEN RIDER SUPER ONE part of the Masked Rider series, Kamen Rider Super One is a human who was turned into a cyborg to fight robot monsters created by an evil scientist for world domination.
- 2) LION MARU set in feudal Japan, Lion Maru is a samurai, who, with the aid of the mightly lion spirit, turns into the mystical warrior Lion Maru to fight the evil Demon Lord and his hellish monsters.
- 3) INAZUMAN Lightning Man is a human being who uses the power of lighting to transform into a superhero who fights the evil monster men who would destroy Japan.



DC COMICS - MAN OF STEEL: After 48 years of publishing, there will be a revitalized Superman. John Byrne will be lending his considerable talents to this major project. The new SUPERMAN book will appear in the fall; the character and mythology will be returned to the creative purity of the original Superman

WATCHMAN: A new series worth watching. It will be a unique and realistic look at heroes in America in 1985. Drawn by Dick Gibbons and written by Alan Moore


